from the Department of Education for the Commodity Food program.

INTRODUCED BY: Commissioner Carey Torrice, Chair Public Services Committee

Background: The Emergency Food and Assistance Program (TEFAP) began in 1981 as a means to reduce the quantity of surplus cheese being stored by the federal government. Since its inception, the number of foods available has varied. All foods are purchased by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) under the support program, surplus removal legislation and the commodity entitlement programs and distributed to the state's needy citizens. The Department of Education is designated by the Governor as the state agency responsible for all programs in the state that use USDA donated foods. The Department designated the community action agencies to have the responsibility of distributing commodities at the local level. The Department of Education has initiated steps to change the current system of receiving commodity food. They have encouraged a regional approach to facilitate direct shipments of commodities. We have assembled a region made of up representatives from the City of Detroit, and the Counties of Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, and Washtenaw.

Grant Period: October 1, 2009 through September 30, 2010

Funding Amount: \$37,042 (No County match required) Funds, made available through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA), are based upon a formula on the basis of the number of people unemployed and those below the poverty level.

Funding Utilization: Funds will be utilized for capital improvement including expansion of the commercial cooler and increased shelving capacity in order to store and distribute more perishable and non-perishable food products.

Customer Eligibility Requirements:

- Individuals must be 60 years of age and older and 160% or below the Poverty Income Guidelines; or
- Under 60 years of age and 130% or below the Poverty Income Guidelines.

Period of Performance: October 1, 2009 through September 30, 2010**Funding Amount:** \$80,190**Funding Utilization:** Funds received are used to offset distribution costs. Funds are received on a quarterly basis.**Description of Services:** TEFAP is a Federal program that helps supplement the diets of low-income Americans, including elderly people, by providing them with surplus food and nutrition assistance at no cost. Under TEFAP, commodity foods are made available by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to States. The Michigan Department of Education provides the food to local agencies (like MCCSA).

Our organization distributes the commodities for household use through our Community Action Centers and network of food pantries. An average of 3,500 families receive assistance through this program.

Friends of MCCSA:



While economic forecasts may remain bleak, MCCSA is committed to helping those in need in the community and achieve our mission to diminish the causes and effects of poverty.



Continuum of Care

The Continuum of Care coordinates funding and planning for services to the homeless in Macomb County.

Head Start

Head Start is a free preschool program for income eligible families. Head Start provides comprehensive education, health, nutrition, and parent involvement services to children and their families.

Early Head Start will soon be offered in Macomb County. Early Head Start provides services for pregnant women and children ages birth through three to support healthy development.

Home Preservation/Energy

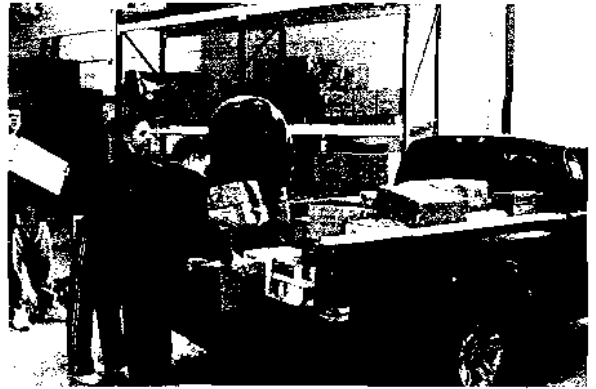
The Home Preservation/Energy group performs whole house audits and weatherization services for homes to improve energy efficiency. Weatherization improvements can save an average of 30% on heat and utility bills.



Program Information

Individual Development Account Program

The Individual Development Account Program provides eligible families with an opportunity to save money and build education toward purchasing their first home.



Macomb Food Program

The Macomb Food Program provides emergency food to Macomb County residents in crisis. A network of 55 food pantry distribution sites provides food to those in need.

Senior Citizen Chore Service & Home Injury Control Program

The Senior Citizen Chore Service assists senior citizens with home maintenance and minor repairs, including snow removal and grass cutting.

The Home Injury Control Program installs home safety devices and has a limited number of handicap ramps to install on a short-term or temporary basis at elderly and disabled client residences.

Senior Nutrition Program

The Senior Nutrition Program helps senior citizens meet their nutritional and social needs through Dining Senior Style and Meals on Wheels.

Dining Senior Style offers midday meals and social opportunities for senior citizens at sites throughout Macomb County.

Frail homebound senior citizens have hot, nutritious meals delivered to their doors through the Meals on Wheels program.



Transportation

Eligible Macomb County residents are provided rides to essential medical appointments, Community Action Centers, and other specific locations. Transportation services are also provided to children attending Head Start preschool and specific Meals on Wheels routes.

American Recovery and Reinvestment Act Update

The Local Impact

MCCSA is a recipient of funding through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA). ARRA funding allowed for expansion of several existing programs and the addition of new initiatives. The following information includes preliminary results of ARRA funding in the initial stages. Program results will evolve as additional staff is hired and services are provided to help people and change lives in Macomb County.

Services to Senior Citizens

Meals on Wheels and Dining Senior Style programs received ARRA funding. This funding allows current Meals on Wheels service levels to remain the same. Dining Senior Style expanded service to provide second meals and emergency meal services. ARRA funding provides 19,351 Meals on Wheels home delivered meals and 32,794 Dining Senior Style congregate dining meals.

Providing Food

MCCSA received ARRA funds from the Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP) and The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP). EFSP funds were used to purchase 1,192,207 pounds of emergency food which assisted 66,234 individuals through the Macomb Food Program's network of pantries. TEFAP funds were used to expand freezer capacity in the Macomb Food Program's warehouse. The larger freezer allows for increased supplies of frozen items for more balanced food boxes.

On Feb. 13, 2009, Congress passed the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) at the urging of President Barack Obama, who signed it into law four days later. A direct response to the economic crisis, the Recovery Act has three immediate goals:

- Create new jobs as well as save existing ones
- Spur economic activity and invest in long-term economic growth
- Foster unprecedented levels of accountability and transparency in government spending

In addition to offering financial aid directly to local school districts, expanding the Child Tax Credit, and underwriting a process to computerize health records to reduce medical errors and save on health care costs, the Recovery Act is targeted at infrastructure development and enhancement. For instance, the Act plans investment in the domestic renewable energy industry and the weatherizing of 75 percent of federal buildings as well as more than one million private homes around the country.

While many of Recovery Act projects are focused more immediately on jumpstarting the economy, others, especially those involving infrastructure improvements, are expected to contribute to economic growth for many years.

Weatherization Contractors Hired through ARRA

MCCSA is using 18 contractors for weatherization, mechanical and roofing work under ARRA funding.

Services to People in Need

MCCSA received ARRA funding for the Weatherization Assistance Program, Head Start, Early Head Start, and the Community Services Block Grant. These programs provide a variety of services to help low income people in need and move them toward self-sufficiency.

Home weatherization will be provided for a projected 1,164 homes under ARRA funding. Weatherization provides energy saving measures such as duct sealing and repair, installation of insulation, and the repair and replacement of furnaces. These measures save the recipient money through lower utility usage.

Head Start is a free preschool program for children from low income families. ARRA funding is providing staff development opportunities for approximately 125 staff members and the addition of nine resource advocates to assist families.

ARRA funding was provided for Early Head Start. This is the first time this program has been offered in Macomb County. Early Head Start provides services for pregnant women and children ages birth through three to support healthy development. Early Head Start will serve 92 families.

ARRA funding for the Community Services Block Grant allowed MCCSA to hire five additional staff for the Community Action Center locations. ARRA funding has also provided emergency assistance to over 550 families in the first five months of activity. The Community Action Centers provide various services to help people improve their level of self-sufficiency.
